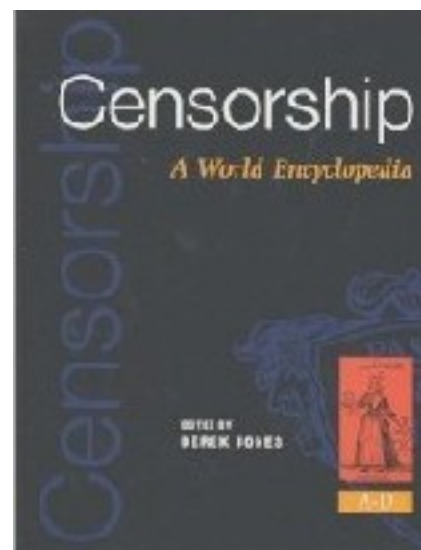

Conducting a Job Search?



Looking to jump start your job search? The **Career Services Resource Room** (Room 130) in Hagerty Library has a wide variety of information available, whether your search is for full-time permanent work or a co-op position. Tom Cummiskey, Career Services Library Assistant, provides individualized guidance to students looking for career and job-seeking information. Topics include: Career Development, Resume Writing, Interview Preparation, International Job Search, and Internship/Co-op Jobs. In addition, the Career Services collection features career-specific books for those wanting more information about a particular career and job prospects within that career field.

New on the shelf this Spring is *The Philadelphia Business Journal Book of Lists 2002*. This is great if you're looking for names of companies to submit your resume to in the Tri-State area. This resource is also available at the Career Management Center in Main Hall via an Excel spreadsheet. Also new are *Current Jobs for Graduates* (Liberal Arts) and *Current Jobs International*. These web-based bulletins offer listings on a monthly basis for full-time job opportunities. ProQuest Fax-Only Articles Now Available...



Good news! Have you ever come across an article in a ProQuest database (either ABI/Inform or Periodical Research Abstracts II) where the fulltext was only available via fax delivery? Feel like tearing out your hair because you don't happen to have your own personal fax machine? Well, now you can receive the article via fax at the public fax machine available at the Circulation Desk on the first floor of the Hagerty Library. (In the past you could receive the article from the fax machine in the Library's Administrative office, but it's not open at night or on weekends.)

This service is free! Here's what will happen:

1) If you encounter an article from ABI/Inform or Periodical Research Abstracts II that cannot be viewed online and is only available via fax, you'll get this message:

"Publisher copyrights prevent online viewing of this article in Full Text format. However, you can fax the article in Full Text format using the fields and button below. "

2) Enter your name in the information box and click the "Send Fax" button. The Library's public fax number is the default fax number. (If you want to send to a different fax machine go right ahead. Just change the phone number.)

3) In about 5-10 minutes your fax will arrive at the Library. Go to the Circulation Desk, give your name, and tell them that you are expecting a ProQuest faxed article.

Terms and Conditions of Use for Electronic Resources



Electronic resources are provided by the Library to members of the Drexel University community as tools for research, teaching, and private study. All Drexel users must respect the copyrights in works that are accessible through computers connected to the Drexel network. No copyrighted work may be copied, published, disseminated, displayed, performed or played without permission of the copyright holder except in accordance with Fair Use (read more about "Fair Use" as defined in [Title 17, Section 107](#)) or licensed agreement.

Commercial use, systematic or "excessive" downloading, or redistribution of electronic information to non-subscribers or to non-subscribing institutions are expressly prohibited.

Generally speaking, authorized users (Drexel currently affiliated students, faculty, and staff) may view, print, save and email electronic content found in the library's electronic resources for personal use. Downloading and electronic redistribution of licensed materials are subject to limitations. The following activities, for example, are prohibited:

- Downloading (saving or printing) an "excessive" portion of a resource, such as an entire journal issue, a complete journal volume, or an entire electronic book
- Redistribution of electronic information to non-subscribers or to non-subscribing institutions
- Posting material downloaded from these resources to a listserv or website
- Using Drexel's e-resources for commercial purposes, i.e. selling content procured through Drexel's access to licensed resources or re-compiling licensed content into a new product intended for re-sale
- Using non-conventional browsers or other sorts of web robots, spiders or crawlers which significantly accelerate the speed of page downloads.

Engaging in such activities jeopardizes the entire university's access to licensed electronic resources. For this reason, Drexel may suspend or terminate a user's access to licensed resource if that user is found to be violating copyright or the Terms of Use of licensed resources. Web activity is monitored carefully by both the Library and the database publishers, and violations can result in suspension or cancellation of the service. Fax Machine Now Available at Hagerty Library

Hagerty Library now offers telefacsimile services for Drexel students, faculty, staff, and alumni. The new fax machine was purchased to meet the needs of many of our students doing research on the Library's ProQuest system, but this same machine can be used by University members to send or receive other faxes as well.

The fee to receive faxes is \$0.10 cents per page. (ProQuest articles requested via fax are free; see the article on [E-Resources News](#) for more information about using the fax machine with ProQuest.) The fees to send faxes are:

Local calls @ \$0.25 cents/page

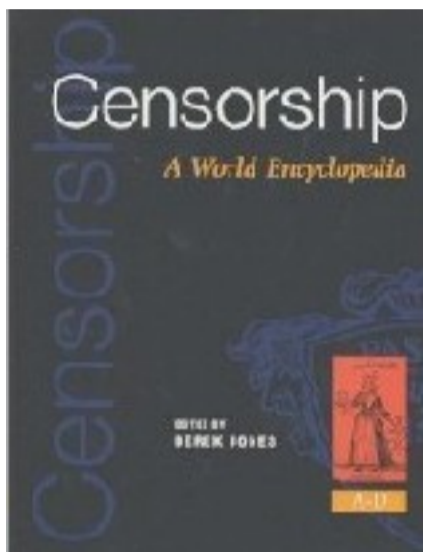
Long-distance calls to the US and CN @ \$1.00 plus .25 cents/page

International calls @ \$1.00 plus \$1.00/page.

The Library's new public service fax number is **215.895.5893**. The fax machine is located behind the Circulation desk. Access Services staff are available to help with your faxing needs.

Selection From the New Book Room



Censorship: A World Encyclopedia / edited by Derek Jones

"But I wonder about the books not written, and here I come to my concern. When certain winds blow they wither everything that is unprotected." -[Doris Lessing](#)*, in her Foreword to *Censorship: A World Encyclopedia*

Defining censorship broadly to include self-censorship and other less overt forms along with more traditional forms such as book banning, the articles in this encyclopedia examine issues of censorship across time and geography. That this encyclopedia encompasses four volumes stands in itself as testament to the complexity and long history of censorship. Articles cover a broad range of countries, individuals, organizations, and topics (such as pornography, music, and war reporting, to name a few). Each country entry offers a "country information box" providing contextual country statistics such as population, illiteracy rate, and number of newspapers, TV and radio receivers, and PCs per 1000 habitants.

Several options help you to find articles of interest. Alphabetical and thematic lists of entries are provided in the front of each volume. A selective index is also provided in the back of Volume 4. While individuals are often included in this index, specific works do not always appear (for instance, you would need to look up J.D. Salinger to find information about *The Catcher in the Rye*). This encyclopedia is highly recommended for anyone interested in any aspect of censorship, for those conducting country-related research, and for anyone interested in better understanding the past and present state of censorship in the United States and around the world. *Censorship: A World Encyclopedia* has been included on the American Library Association's list of [Outstanding Reference Sources for Small and Medium-sized Libraries, 2002](#). -- *Reviewed by Laura Moyer*

Detecting Plagiarism: A Workshop for Faculty

Stories of plagiarism are in the news and incidences in the classroom are on the rise, making plagiarism a hot topic on campuses throughout the nation. Discussions about how and why students plagiarize help us understand the phenomena, but faculty members need to be knowledgeable about detecting and preventing plagiarism as well.

Today's students are comfortable moving quickly between traditional academic resources such as libraries and course readings to the virtual realm of information available on the Web. Many faculty members, however, remain unfamiliar with the landscape of electronic information alternatives that students use.

Join your colleagues for an informal, hands-on workshop on detecting and preventing plagiarism. We'll cover:

- designing plagiarism resistant assignments
- using free web services, search engines, and library resources to detect plagiarism
- evaluating fee-based plagiarism detection services.
