Who would have thought that a book about cooking could be a page-turner and a hand-ringer? *The Soul of a Chef* is divided into three sections. The first follows the

contestants of the Certified Master Chef examination at the Culinary Institute of Arts. As you read about the chefs taking the exam, you can't help but worry whether Brian's consommé will turn out or if Eric will pass the Buffet test (he's already failed the Terrine test). The second section describes the personalities behind the successful Cleveland, OH restaurant, Lola, and finally, Ruhlman takes his readers behind the scenes of one of the best restaurants in the country, French Laundry.

Read about the education and formation of New York chef and writer Anthony Bourdain. He also offers advice to future chefs and tips for getting the best meal at a restaurant.

An all-encompassing and critical look at the U.S. fast food industry, *Fast Food Nation* explores the impact that fast food has had on the United States. Economic and health issues related to fast food are explored as well as the technology behind making French fries so tasty. The Triangle, Drexel's student newspaper, has been published continuously since 1926. Currently, more than 200 issues of the newspaper from 14 different years are available online. Issues are now available online from the following years: 1926, 1949-1951, 1990-1997, and 2000-2001.

Each edition of the newspaper is scanned by an archives technician and saved as a PDF file. Many of the resulting files are quite large in size so it is recommended that users access the collection from computers that have broadband connections to the Internet.

In addition to scanning and placing *The Triangle* online, the University Archives has created an index to the paper with coverage from the present to 1949. This list of article titles and personal names contains over 49,000 entries.

The goal of the University Archives is to place all available issues of *The Triangle*, as well as the searchable index, online. For now, however, if you are interested in researching a particular subject that may have been covered by *The Triangle*, please do not hesitate to contact the Archives. Archives' personnel can search *The Triangle* index and provide you with a list of relevant citations.

The Triangle is also available in print at the University Archives and in microfilm format in Current Periodicals on the first floor of Hagerty Library.

The origins of what are today considered artists' books can be seen as early as William Blake's *Songs of Innocence and of Experience* ([JUV PR4144.S6 1947](#)), originally published in 1794. The idea of what artists' books are has developed significantly since their popularity among the Dadaists in the early twentieth century. To learn more about artists' books you may want to look at Johanna Drucker's *The Century of Artists' Books* ([N7433.3.D78 1995](#)) or have a look at the Book Arts Web (<http://www.philobiblon.com>).

Career Services News: Interviews -- How to Make a Good Impression

Here are some tips to keep in mind for making a good impression on your job interview:

1. Arrive on time!
2. Dress appropriately -- clean and neat, not overdone, but no jeans, either!
3. Do NOT chew gum.
4. Use a firm handshake.
5. Smile.
6. Speak in a natural, relaxed tone.
7. Maintain eye contact.
8. Sit upright.
9. Listen.
10. Send a thank-you note immediately following the interview.
